

Triple vaccine (diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough and oral polio vaccine will be given. Measles vaccine will be given to pre-school children over 12 months of age, who have not had measles. Rubella will also be given to children 12 months of age through age 10 if there is no pregnancy in the home.

It is mandatory by law for all children to receive polio vaccine, rubella and measles vaccine before entering school. The clinic will be conducted by the Public Health Nurses, assisted by the School Nurse Teacher, under the supervision of Dr. A. E. Dodds, Health Officer. A second clinic will be held May 7, 1973, 1-2 P.M.

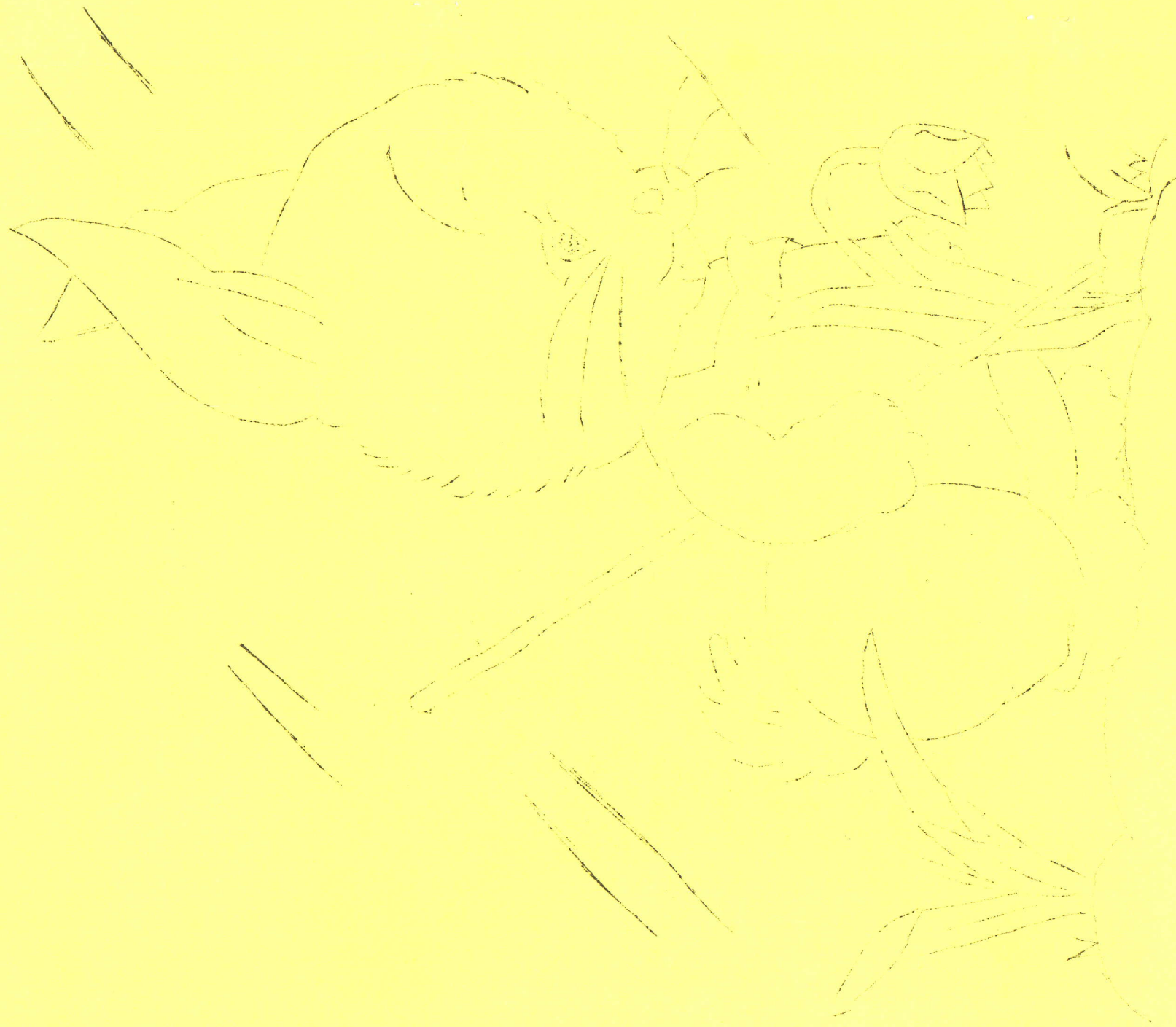

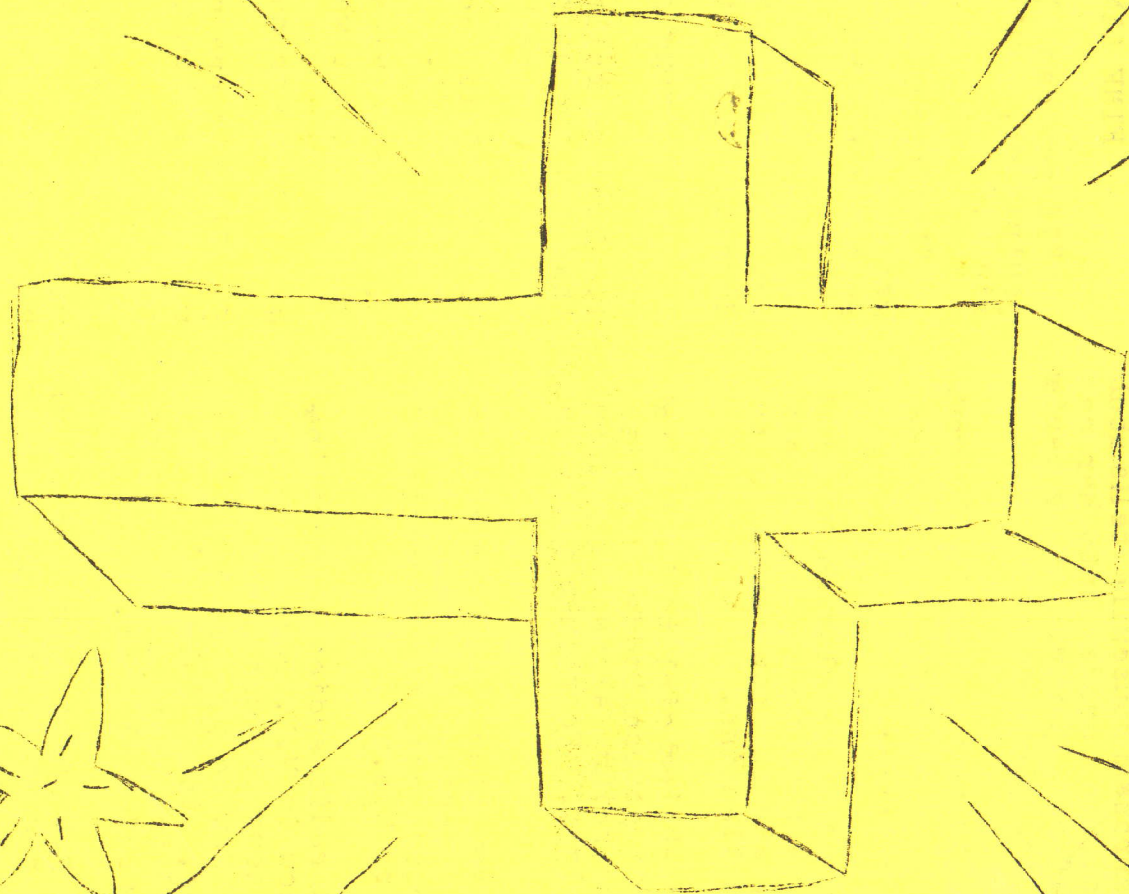
